Saints Peter & Paul Apostles (First Century)

This day commemorates the two preeminent apostles of the early Church. Of the two, St. Peter was among the twelve disciples called by Jesus. Originally named Simon, Jesus gave him an Aramaic name, Cephas, meaning “Rock”. This inspired a memorable pun when Jesus told him, “You are Cephas (Peter) and upon this rock I will build my church”. The occasion was Jesus’ question to the disciples: “Who do you say I am?” which prompted Peter’s reply: “You are the Christ”. Peter emerges in the Gospels as a complex character, bold, impetuous, capable of fear, doubt, and childlike meekness; in short, a fully human creature. It was this “Rock” who denied Christ three times after his arrest but who later repented his betrayal and courageously assumed leadership of the early Church.



St. Paul, a devout Jew, was initially a persecutor of the Church. But after receiving a dazzling vision of the Risen Lord, he was convinced that Jesus was the Messiah. He went on to become a zealous missionary and servant of the Gospel. His letters to the early Christian communities became foundational documents for the early Church. By providing a theological rationale for the universality of the Gospel he was largely responsible for extending the Church to the wider gentile world. He suffered persecution in many forms and was eventually martyred in Rome, where Peter, too, suffered the same fate.

In their spring general assembly this month, just four months before the Synod on the Family in Rome, top U.S. bishops took a united stand in support of marriage and family life as the Church has always understood it.

An incorrectly translated relation document, as well as skewed media coverage and news of the "Kasper proposal" during last year's Extraordinary Synod led to confusion among some Catholics about the purpose and practical effects of the Synod on the Family.

This year, speculation and anticipation about the outcome of the synod has been rampant, causing Pope Francis himself to call for more prayer and less "gossip" about the upcoming meeting.

Dear Padre

What does the Church teach about animal cruelty? What constitutes cruelty to animals?

I think rodeos are cruel to animals, others don't. My sister thinks I'm cruel when I leave my two dogs in cages while at work. Does the Church teach anything about this?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (2416-2418) talks about how we should treat animals. In short, animals are God's creatures and we owe them kindness. However, we may use animals for food, clothing, and to help us in our work and leisure. Therefore, it is morally acceptable to use animals for medical and scientific experiments within reasonable limits if they contribute to caring for and saving human lives. But we should not cause animals to suffer or die needlessly, and we should not spend excessive money on them that could go toward relieving human misery or love animals with the same affection due only to persons.

Thus, using animals in rodeos could be justified as entertainment. No one tries to injure the animals on purpose. In fact, people often go out of their way to keep the animals healthy.

As for caging your dogs, there are tiny cages that could inflict cruelty and other types that afford comfort, space, and safety. But if you cage your dogs, also make certain they get adequate exercise.
