Blessed Among Us Mev Puleo Witness to Solidarity (1963-1996)

When she was fourteen, Mev Puleo, a young American, accompanied her parents on a trip to Brazil. While riding a bus up a steep hill to view the famous statue of Christ the Redeemer overlooking Rio de Janeiro, she could see on one side the opulent homes and immaculate beaches enjoyed by the rich. On the other side she saw "ramshackle homes, children in rags, young and old begging for our coins.' These contradictions laid the foundation for



her vocation: to create a bridge between the different worlds she had viewed from

Photography was her special means. She traveled throughout the Third World, documenting the life, struggles, and humanity of the poor. Her aim was "to revere the human spirit and bridge the distance between persons." In Latin America she interviewed activists, prophetic bishops, and liberation theologians, sharing in writings and presentations a vision of a Church and a world renewed in the light of God's reign.

Two years after her marriage in 1992 she was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor. She still continued her work. In 1995 she received the U.S. Catholic Award for furthering the cause of women in the Church. She died on January 12, 1996, at the age of thirty-two.

"Jesus didn't die to save us from suffering—he died to teach us how to suffer. Sometimes I actually mean it. I'd rather die young, having lived a life crammed with meaning, than to die old, even in security, but without meaning."—Mev Puleo

We Are Called

Can you remember your baptism? Not many of us can, because most of us were baptized as infants. In the early church it was adults who were baptized. Only later did it become common to baptize infants.

When adults are baptized, they speak for themselves and their intention to accept the demands of the Christian life. Infants have godparents to speak for them. When infants grow up, however, they must come to an understanding and acceptance of the gift and responsibilities of their baptism.



In today's Gospel, we read of John baptizing adults in the Jordan River. This was a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sin" (Mark 1:4).

Jesus accepted John's baptism though he had no need for the repentance. Yet, as his first public act, Jesus joined with ordinary people responding to the grace of God. Baptism is initiation into Christ. We "put on Christ." That is a call and a way of life, not a membership.

Pope Francis, in his address in Philadelphia last September, talked about the history of the church as being not so much a history of building cathedral walls as one of Christians building lives and communities of love and service. He gave the example of U.S. Saint Katharine Drexel. Katharine had asked Pope Leo XIII to meet the needs of the missions. Pope Leo responded, "What about you? What are you doing?"

What about me; what am I doing? What are you doing? Each one of us shares the baptism of water and the Spirit. Each one of us is equipped by grace, and we are sent to be Christ in the world today.

To the extent that we live and act as Christ in every corner of our lives, we, too, will be ready one day to hear the voice of God: "You are my [child], with you I am well pleased."
